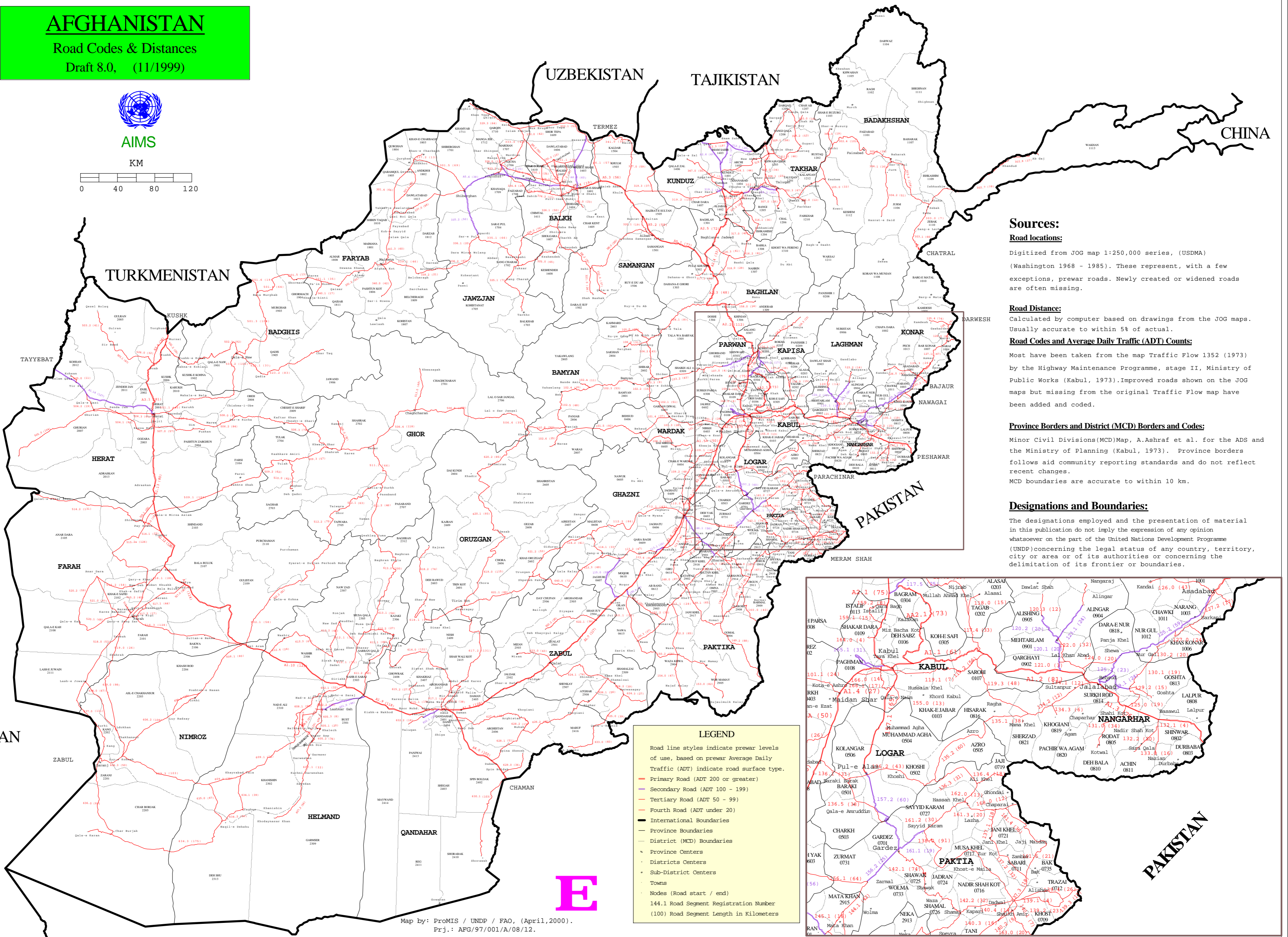

Road locations:

Digitized from JOG map 1:250,000 series, (USDMA) (Washington 1968 - 1985). These represent, with a few exceptions, prewar roads. Newly created or widened roads are often missing.

Road Distance:

Calculated by computer based on drawings from the JOG maps. Usually accurate to within 5% of actual.

Road Codes and Average Daily Traffic (ADT) Counts:

Most have been taken from the map Traffic Flow 1352 (1973) by the Highway Maintenance Programme, stage II, Ministry of Public Works (Kabul, 1973). Improved roads shown on the JOG maps but missing from the original Traffic Flow map have been added and coded.

Province Borders and District (MCD) Borders and Codes:

Minor Civil Divisions(MCD)Map, A.Ashraf et al. for the ADS and the Ministry of Planning (Kabul, 1973). Province borders follows aid community reporting standards and do not reflect recent changes. MCD boundaries are accurate to within 10 km.

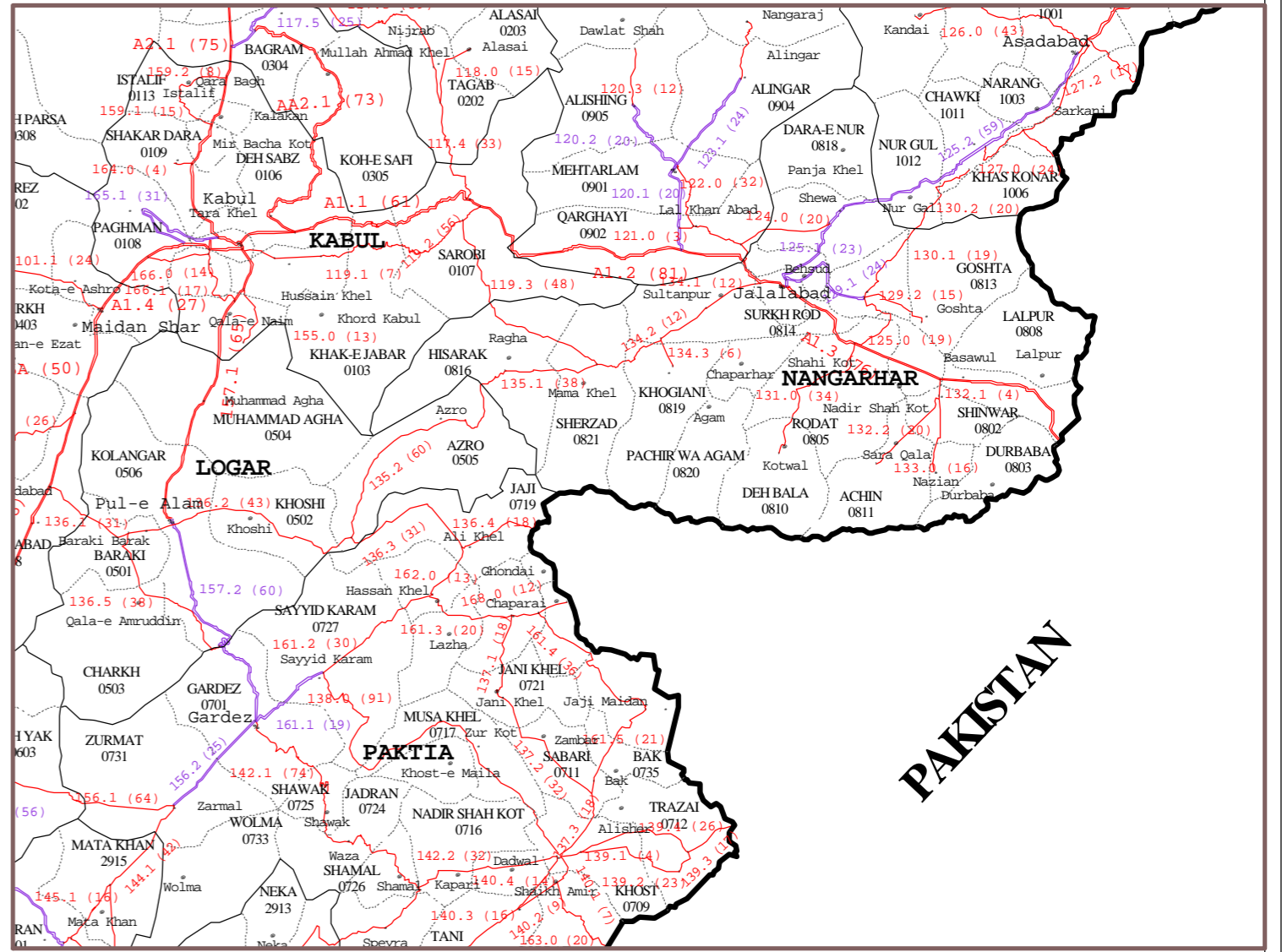
